Deadline: April 1, 2019

The Alumnae of Northwestern University is soliciting proposals to bring distinguished scholars, speakers, and artists to campus for lectures, master classes, or performances in the 2019-2020 academic year. The primary goal is to enrich the intellectual and cultural learning experience of undergraduate students and/or the entire University community. Please help us build interest in this grant by sharing this information and the April 1, 2019 submission date with appropriate directors of any offices, institutes, or centers.

This year approximately \$24,000 of funding is available. It may be awarded in its entirety to support one project, or awarded in smaller amounts to several worthy proposals. Some past recipients have combined their grant award with other funding resources.

Recent grant recipients include:

- Weinberg College's Department of African American Studies and Program in Gender & Sexuality Studies' daylong "Alchemy of Race and Rights" Conference celebrating legal scholar Patricia J. Williams' groundbreaking autobiographical essay on race, gender and class;
- School of Communication's "Cuban Theatre: Another Tempest" Workshop, featuring the development of the first-ever English language translation of Cuban director Flora Lauten and playwright Raquel Carrrio's internationally-acclaimed production of "La Otra Tempestad," an adaptation of Shakespeare's "The Tempest";
- Medill School of Journalism, Media, Integrated Marketing Communications' undergraduate program at Medill on the Hill in Washington, D.C.'s "Reporting Challenges in the Era of Fake News" lecture series;

 Keynote guest lecture by Gus Casely-Hayford, director of the Smithsonian's National Museum of African Art, celebrating the opening of the Block Museum's main gallery exhibition, "Caravans of Gold, Fragments in Time: Art, Culture, and Exchange across Medieval Saharan Africa," which runs from Jan. 26-July 21, 2019.

Application process:

The Committee of Academic Enrichment of The Alumnae of Northwestern manages the application and selections process. To apply, submit the completed **Request for Funding Proposal Form** and provide a brief description of the project.

Proposals must include the following information:

- A project description, including a line-item budget;
- An estimate of the number of undergraduates who would be impacted by the project;
- An explanation of how the project would enrich undergraduate education;
- A statement indicating whether partial funding will be acceptable; if so, include a list of additional funding sources;
- A statement describing how this award from The Alumnae of Northwestern University would be acknowledged or publicized throughout the life of the project.

Proposals that are more than two pages or that do not include all information requested above will not be considered.

Funds will be processed through the University's accounting office; processing the grant shall conform to the University's policies and procedures. Northwestern chart string numbers for transferring funds must be provided. Please note that this grant is not subject to the University's development fee.

Expectations of grant recipients:

- Grant recipients must submit a one-page final report to the Academic Enrichment Committee, with a copy to their dean or director, within six weeks of the event.
- The report should describe:
 - how the funds were used
 - how the recipient accomplished the goals of the grant
 - what impact the grant had on the recipient's program
- Recipients will provide evidence (including receipts) for utilized funds and return unused funding to The Alumnae of Northwestern University.
- Recipients will be required to acknowledge funding from The Alumnae of Northwestern University in communications and promotion.
- Grant funds must be used by August 31, 2020.
- If the proposed event cannot be completed within the proposed time period, the grant recipient must receive prior approval from the Academic Enrichment Committee before proceeding.

Proposal Deadline:

- Proposal submissions must be received via <u>form</u>, <u>website</u> or by <u>email</u> on or before **April 1**,
 2019.
- Proposals received after that date will not be considered.
- All proposals will be acknowledged within 15 days of receipt. If you fail to receive notification, contact The Alumnae at <u>AlumnaeNorthwestern@gmail.com</u>. Recipients of Academic Enrichment grants will be **notified by June 1, 2019**.
